
GROWING in FAITH

conversations with a sound system advisor, and the Design Team is meeting to start working out the details of the finishing touches in the areas that have received new carpet.



In November of 2022, the Legacy Endowment Fund Charter was established with a memorial gift from the family of a long-time member who wanted to help the church to fund new missions and ministries for years to come. The money was put into an investment account that will help this initial seedling to grow and multiply and bear fruit for future generations.

Future gifts given and dedicated to this fund will be invested, and when the fund reaches a minimum level of \$100,000, we may begin using a percentage of the interest generated each year to fund new ministry initiatives—programs and ideas that are beyond the church's established programs funded through the annual operating budget. The intention is that all endowed gifts to the Legacy Fund be used to generate interest through investment and not used for basic operational needs, thus ensuring we always have a means to fund new programs and ideas.

Gifts to this fund may be made at any time and in any amount. You may also designate memorial gifts to be placed in this fund for a lasting legacy.

Please note that the Investment/Endowment Committee carefully manages this fund with oversight from the Board of Trustees. If you have questions about this fund, or would like to make a gift, please contact the church office and you will be connected with a member of the Investment Committee. The entire Legacy Endowment Fund Charter and Use Policy documents are available for review upon request.

Founded in 1967, it is recognized as Haiti's leading medical facility dedicated to the treatment of children with tuberculosis (TB). Each year, the hospital receives thousands of children who are suffering from TB, HIV, and other diseases. With both an inpatient ward and outpatient services, Grace provides a place of healing and solace to children.

Grace's outpatient ward provides affordable health care, including pediatric and adult TB treatment, a nutrition clinic ,state-of the -art eyecare, HIV/Aids counseling and treatment, and even literacy training.

Please continue to give your change to the noisy bucket initiative. Last month, we donated \$326 to UMCOR, providing relief to those affected by the fires in Hawaii.




